

The 2010 Good Jobs, Green Jobs National Conference is the premier U.S. event promoting how investments in the green energy economy can create good, green jobs across the United States. Every year, the Conference is attended by leaders at the highest levels — including members of Congress and the administration; corporate and industry executives, labor presidents, leaders from the nonprofit groups and foundations, investors, thought leaders and academics — all united in an effort to innovate, invest and take action to create good jobs while solving global warming.

The Conference attracts thousands of supporters and stakeholders in the green economy. The event has grown dramatically — more than 1,000 people attended our 2008 Conference in Pittsburgh, a number that increased to more than 2,700 people at the 2009 Conference in Washington D.C. We expect the number of Conference participants to double again in 2010.

In addition, 4,000 people attended the 2009 **Green Jobs Expo**, a free and open event showcasing the many pathways to green jobs and careers. The 2010 Expo will feature more than 100 booths and displays from businesses, academic institutions, nonprofit organizations and government agencies highlighting the innovative thinking in the emerging green economy. We expect attendance for this year's Expo to increase as well. The 2010 Conference goals will be met through a series of workshops, plenary sessions and media events.

The following are the goals to be accomplished:

- Provide a forum for bringing labor, environment and business together to discuss how we can turn ideas into action to build a new green economy in the United States;
- Demonstrate the diversity of the coalition supporting the green economy;
- Showcase the successes of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act and the ideas and strategies that have already been implemented to build a new, green economy;
- Underscore the breadth of private-sector investment and job creation in the green economy;
- Identify additional federal and state policy tools to accelerate the growth of the green economy and the creation of clean energy jobs;
- Highlight strategies for rebuilding the middle class and for creating opportunities for underserved and underemployed communities with clean energy investments; and
- Model partnerships between federal agencies, the private sector and local interests.

Speakers. Speakers and presenters at the 2010 Conference include prominent national leaders and leading experts from government, business, labor and academia, as well as the environmental, public health and scientific communities.

Workshop and Plenary Presentations. The Conference will alternate between plenary sessions — providing a stage for prominent national experts — and workshops, which will allow all practitioners to explore new ideas and exchange best practices. Plenary presentations and workshops will provide a forum for discussing strategies for developing a robust, green economy. The Conference will focus on how solutions to environmental challenges can be used to drive economic development and create successful and profitable businesses.
